

I was in afghanistan in 2003 on OP Athena ROTO 0 with the NSE. We were visited by Col Johnston and CWO Vass, then the EME branch Chief. I remember Col Johnston being very excited to hear that Camp Julien was relying on RCEME soldiers to perform gate guard and camp security duties. He asked for permission to join us on the gate that night during our shift, because he had to be out there with, as he called us, "Canada's Fightin' Craftsmen".

I've always treasured the memories of that visit. Driving the Col and CWO around the camp in an Iltis to do a perimeter check, hearing him talk to all of us in turn, and for those brief few seconds of face time, having Col Johnston treat you like you were the most important person in the world.

I was amazed by his memory, and how, in one instance of being the first time ever meeting a soldier, he recognized the last name, and remembered meeting that soldier's Father on deployment in the 70s.

Col Murray Johnston was one of the officers who served with the Canadian Delegation to the International Commission of Control and Supervision (CANDEL ICCS) in Vietnam in 1973. CANDEL ICCS senior leadership was Ambassador Michel Gauvin and MGen Duncan McAlpine. Col Johnston was Commander of Region Seven based in Can Tho from Feb to Jul 73.

The CANDEL ICCS Association was created on our return to Canada in 1973 and Col Johnston attended most of the annual reunions held in Ottawa from 1974 until 2019.



## **REGION SEVEN**


The first group of ICCS Canadians arrived in Can Tho on 5 February and were followed by team members between 21 - 23 February.

Because of the large member of incidents reported in this region, no one could complain of lack of work. With the increase in workload came an ever increasing presence of members of the international press corps, culminating in the visit by External Affairs Minister, Mitchell Sharp, on 17 March, when almost 30 newspaper, radio and television reporters descended on Can Tho and were given a true-to-life description of a typical ICCS region by Colonel M.C. Johnson and Major R.V. Roe.

Results of investigations have produced some unique findings. For example, bridges blowndown, not up and the vast majority of truce violations are committed by bandits. Findings such as these, however did not dampen Canadian enthusiasm.

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


